<u>Days of Remembrance for Victims of</u> <u>the Holocaust</u> men, women and children by the Nazi regime in the 1930s and 40s. Congress established the annual Days of Remembrance as the nation's annual commemoration of the Holocaust.

The internationally recognized date for Holocaust Remembrance Day corresponds to the 27th day of Nisan on the Hebrew calendar. It marks the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising.

The theme for this year is "Learning from the Holocaust: Legacy of Perseverance." During this week, the Army community joins the nation to remember not only the millions of victims and survivors of the Holocaust, but also the heroes whose actions saved incalculable lives.
