
113 years of courageous service to the Army and the Nation

The Army War College congratulates the 24 Army Reserve resident students and the 130 Army Reserve distance education students along with the 199,000 Reserve Soldiers who protect our national interests around the globe.

Bettina Avent, director of the Reserve Component Integration Office at the Army War College. "They are the best citizens our nation has today.
