Each February during Black History Month, the Army War College recognizes students from local area middle schools for their writing skills as part of its annual Black History Month Observance.

The Army War College observed Black History Month, Feb. 18 in Bliss Hall. The observance included 3 speakers, two War College students, Col. Tom Noble and Lt. Col. Anastasia McKay and Earth-Shameenah Holman, a Nurse Practitioner and the recognition of 18 students from six local area middle schools for their writing skills as part of its Black History Month Observance.

"I am real excited that i get to help recognize a special set of Carlisle area middle school students," said Maj. Gen. David Hill the Army War College Commandant. "who wrote inspirational essays linking African American health and wellness and fitness," he said.

Students wrote essays focusing on the contributions and history of African Americans such as sickle cell pioneer Marilyn Hughes Gaston as they considered this year's theme "Black Health & Wellness"

Col. Noble talked about own experience with African American health and well-being inequities, along with historical examples, the rise in suicides in black youth and steps in seeking behavioral health to curb the rise.

Lt. Col. McKay discussed Diabetes. Why is it more common in African Americans, some preventable measures and environmental factors that can cause diabetes.

Mrs. Holman will touch on African American trailblazers in healthcare, the representation of African Americans in healthcare and the importance of access to care.
