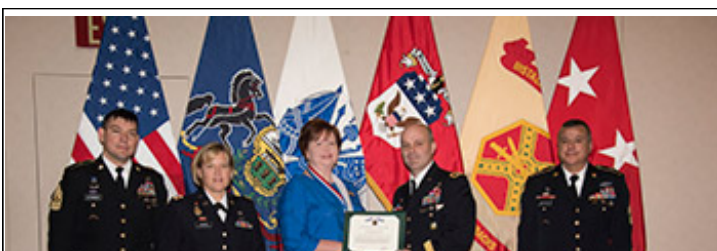

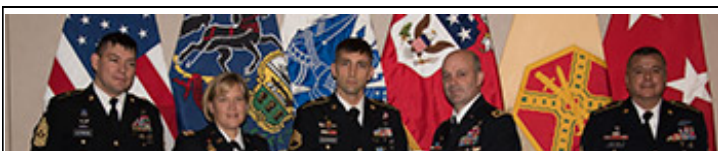
the team in making improvements in those programs. ACS clients routinely compliment her positive attitude, and helpful, friendly personality.

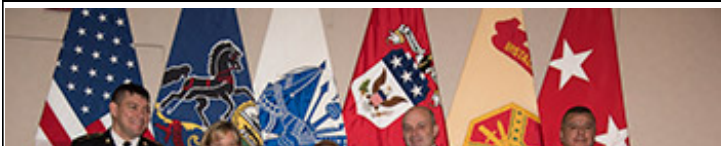
