

USAHEC presents - Signals intelligence to cyber: Deep background, WW2-Cold War

Tracking Signals Intelligence through history through its contribution to cyber development, Dr. David Hatch will address "Signals Intelligence and Cyber: The Deep Background from World War II to the Cold War." SIGINT was a new concept for most American commanders during World War II, and it became an important tool for both military and civilian decision makers. After the war, the United States established its first peacetime national-level intelligence organizations, and the way the SIGINT agencies developed in the Cold War had a direct bearing on the emergence of cyber later in the century.

Dr. Hatch earned his M.A. at Indiana University in Bloomington, and his

Ph.D. at American University in the District of Columbia. He served in the U.S. Army, and has worked at NSA since the 1970s; he became its Historian in 1993. He is the author of a number of classified and unclassified articles and books about cryptologic history and NSA, and has contributed to TV documentaries.
