This year marks the centennial of The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Since 1921, it has provided a final resting place for unidentified American service members from World War I, World War II and the Korean War.

"The Unknown Soldier today represents all of the men and women not just unknown but buried in faraway cemeteries the world over," said Dr. Michael Neiberg. The memorial and grave for three unknown American service members serves as reminder of service and sacrifice, and connects visitors at the Arlington National Cemetery to the legacy of the U.S. Armed Forces throughout the nation's history.
